

The Thread Of Mu'awiya: The Making Of A Marja' Taqlid



Synopsis

The marja'āt-e or grand ayatollahs are the scholars who sit at the pinnacle of the Shi'ite religious hierarchy. Normally learned and reclusive men, they nonetheless wield enormous authority through their religious prestige and the funds generated by religious taxes. From their modest homes in the Shi'ite shrines cities of Iraq and Iran, their influence reaches across the Shi'ite world carried by networks of sons, sons-in-law, students, and local clerics. This book reveals the process by which a handful of religious scholars become recognized as grand ayatollahs, the way their influence is exercised, and how they relate to other Shi'ite clerics and to ordinary believers. Based on scores of interviews with Shi'ite clerics, this book gives a detailed and human portrait of the inner world of the Shi'ite clerical hierarchy. The late Linda Walbridge was an anthropologist of religion specializing in minorities in the Islamic world. Her other works include *Without Forgetting the Imam: Shi'ism in an American Community*, *The Most Learned of the Shi'ite Clerics: The Institution of the Marja'āt-e Taqlid*, and *The Christians of Pakistan: The Passion of Bishop John Joseph*.
