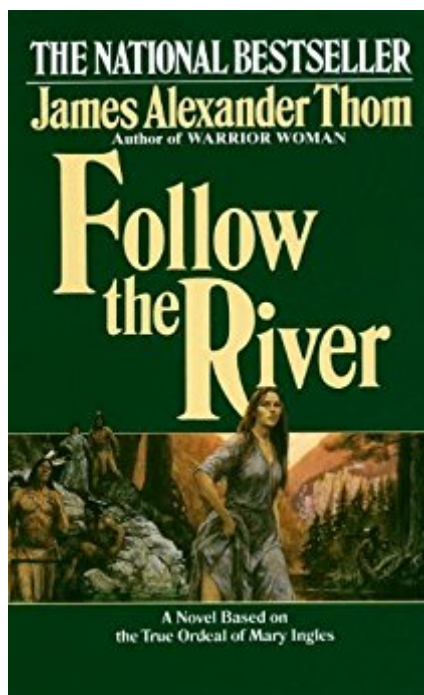

For months, she lived with them, unbroken, until she escaped, and followed a thousand mile trail to freedom--an extraordinary story of a pioneer woman who risked her life to return to her people. It was a raw tale, and hard to read in some parts, but I am very glad I finished it. Sad to see how many lives were lost in order for this country to be formed, especially with all of the hostility going on in the world today. This should be a "must read" for all who live in the United States.

This book, tells the story of Mary Ingles, who was kidnapped, along with her children, in a Shawnee Indian raid on her village in Virginia in the late 1700's. She was taken to an area of Kentucky and along with a Dutch woman named Ghetel (Gretel), escaped the Indian encampment (leaving her newly born daughter) and followed the river, along the Ohio and many other rivers and creeks, through the Allegheny mountains back to her home in Virginia. That is amazing in itself, but Mary and Ghetel made the 1000 mile trek on foot with only a tomahawk and the clothes on their backs. Even though the leaving of her baby may leave the reader with feelings of anger toward her, if Mary had taken her baby she surely would not have survived the journey. She was, at least, fed and cared for by the Otter Girl. The book begins quietly enough, but once the raid begins, the tale is brutally graphic with the description of the raid in Drapers Meadow. From the Ingles side of the tale, the Indians were heathen savages, but with the Indian side of the tale told, these raids and kidnappings were part of a retaliation toward the white settlers for similar attacks on their people. This true story of Mary Ingles' capture and escape, a feat very few people could accomplish, is gripping, moving and a highly recommended read.

This is one of the best books I have ever read. Period. The fact that it is based on a true story makes it even more incredible. I think what the Indianapolis News said of this author sums it up perfectly, "It takes a rare individual not only to see that history can live, but also to make it live for others. James Thom has that gift." This author really brought this incredible, historical event to life

for me. Reading this book changed me. What more can you ask for when you pick up a book? It is in my top 5 favorite books of all time and is always among the first that I recommend people read when they ask for recommendations. Do yourself a favor and give this book a permanent home on your bookshelf.
