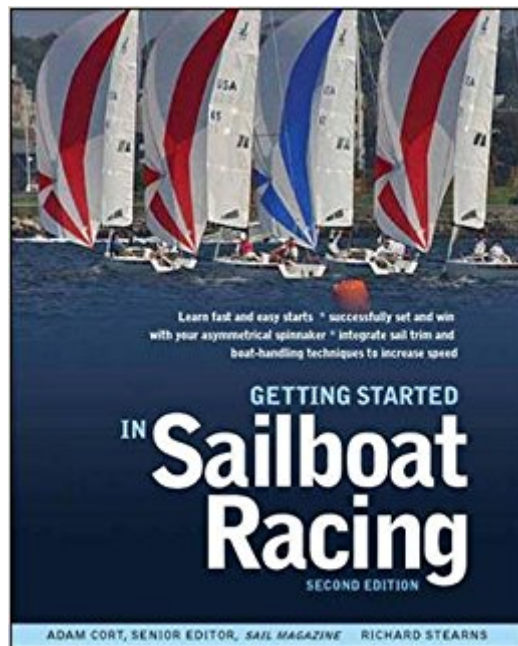




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Getting Started In Sailboat Racing, 2nd Edition (International Marine-RMP)

Adam Cort is a former editor and regular contributor to Sailing magazine. He is a lifelong sailor, has cruised extensively, and has sailed and raced dinghies, maxis, and most boats in between. Richard Stearns is an America's Cup veteran and career sailor, sailmaker, boatbuilder and boat salesman. He has participated in 39 Chicago to Mackinac races winning 5 times, competed in 5 Olympic campaigns, won multiple North American championships and competed in Worlds and hemispheric championships around the world. Stearns has compiled an impressive record of international victories including three wins in the Southern Ocean Racing Circuit (SORC). Rich has won championships in boats from the 11 foot Penguin dinghy to 70-foot yachts.

There's no better introduction to sailboat racing ever published. Many sailing books suffer from a surfeit of jargon, incomprehensible amateur prose and cute inside references...at least, that would be true for most of the dozens I have attempted to read. Cort and Stearns assume you have basic sail handling skills, such as the ability to tack, gybe and fly a spinnaker. Other than that, they start from scratch. They do a beautiful job of explaining each phase of a race--start, windward leg, mark rounding, downwind strategy, finishing--in clear and simple language. Every element is covered logically and with easy to follow examples drawn from their own extensive experience. The diagrams are simple enough to follow, but don't leave out anything. It's a brilliant piece of instructional writing that can be read over and over again, and I have given copies to each one of my own crew. If you want to race and want to win, get this book and read it many times. And don't skip the Epilogue, which is a poetic description of why we sail that has restored my sense of

proportion more than once.

As a beginner to racing, this book is a must. I am still reading, replaying last summer races, to find out what needs correcting, improving and, what went correct. Most situations that occur while racing is covered, It covers how, where, to sail a course. With tactics, compass headings and, when best to tack/gibe. This book is like a classroom, while reading I can replay practices and, racing event, see what I did, to what I should have done. I am still reading/rereading this book replaying scenarios, it's like an adult video game, Just Awesome !! I started with "One Design" by Dave Perry: w/out racing experience, for me wrong book. The book is very informative. It presents the information in a readable/learnable manner. Can't say enough good things about it! Although I have sailed for some time, I never learned to push a boat to the edge. This book teaches some of the nuances of trim that allow you to coax hull speed out of your boat on a regular basis- or get real close to it! HUGE issue---- I bought this as a digital book versus a printed copy. This is one of those books you really need onboard in a readable format. For example- the book addresses things like backstay tension for various points of sail. This is something that one really wants as a reference while sailing. If I had purchased a paper version it would have stickie-bookmarks for each point of sail. While it is theoretically possible to do this on a digital device, even on a 33 foot sailboat, managing a touch screen and reading it on deck as the spray is flying is "challenging". Bottom line- buy it!

I'm a racing newbie and this book was EXACTLY what the doctor ordered. I can't tell you if the information is expert enough, but for a guy like me, this is what I needed. It gets right through the basic rules, etc., and then into the fundamental strategy issues.

This book is exceedingly clear and easy to understand. I race Flying Scots and Ensign's, none too successfully, I might add. But this book will help for sure. Having read many small boat racing books from Stuart Walker (many) to Dave Perry to Ted Wells this effort by Cort and Stearns might be the best. It is unquestionably the best place to start.

This assumes you already know how to sail. But if you've never raced or you're just starting out or even if you're an experienced racer this gives you just what you need. It doesn't get into the gory

details of super fine tuning and tweaking which is good because for the beginner it concentrates mostly just on the big picture. It gives a terrific summation of the most common rules while not concentrating on the corner cases. So you'll be able to get out there and race without getting into too many protest meetings. I re-read this book before each of the first five seasons I raced and got more out of it each time.

This is a very well written book for the novice sailboat racer. It tells you everything you need to know to get started, however there is much more involved than just reading and understanding. There is much material to grasp and absorb, too much to take in during one reading. During my first series of races after I finished the book I still came in last place, not because the book was inadequate, but because the learning curve for racing requires much practice. Buying and reading this book is a worthwhile investment if you are serious about racing. Just be prepared to learn a little at a time and practice a lot. And better yet, take someone with you who is good at racing who can teach you as you sail. One of our sailing club's other members went from near last place to second place this past weekend after having a very experienced sailor as his crew. Sailboat racing is very challenging, but then how much fun would it be if it was easy?
